The Idaho Division of Veterans Services in conjunction with the Idaho National Guard, Idaho Veterans Network and other partnerships through Joining Forces has developed a digital resource guide for Idaho veterans.

The Idaho Veterans Guide can be found at www.idahoveteransguide.org. Not only can free and reduced cost resources for Idaho be accessed through this portal but it will work with any zip code in the United States. There is no advertising, and the listings are verified and updated regularly.

About 80% of resources in Idaho that the IDVS Community Resource Team and I refer people to are already listed in the guide. We are working directly with the other 20% of our trusted resources (ex. VFW and American Legion Posts) to get them listed as Veteran Support Organizations. Also, by using this portal, we have access to the resources that Idaho veterans and their families are searching for.

Finance Officer:

During the month of July 2023, Post 154 received income of \$1,314.14 and had expenses of \$2,016.69. Net loss for the month of July was \$702.55. The majority of our income this month was from membership renewals (\$720), donations to our Honor Guard (\$300). Other sources were member donations for Boys State (\$21) and the North Idaho Veterans Home (\$20), deposit for one Legion dress hat (\$40), flag sale (\$31), donations from our booth at Rathdrum Days – Thank you to the Volunteers who set up, worked and took down that booth – (\$178) interest and a patch sale.

Expenses were for membership renewals (\$600), Honor Guard expenses for rifle stock refinishing and quarterly travel reimbursement (\$1,294.90) Picnic expenses (\$75) and Poppy expenses (\$46.79).

We have \$85,747 in Capital Reserves, invested in CD's and our Money Market Account.

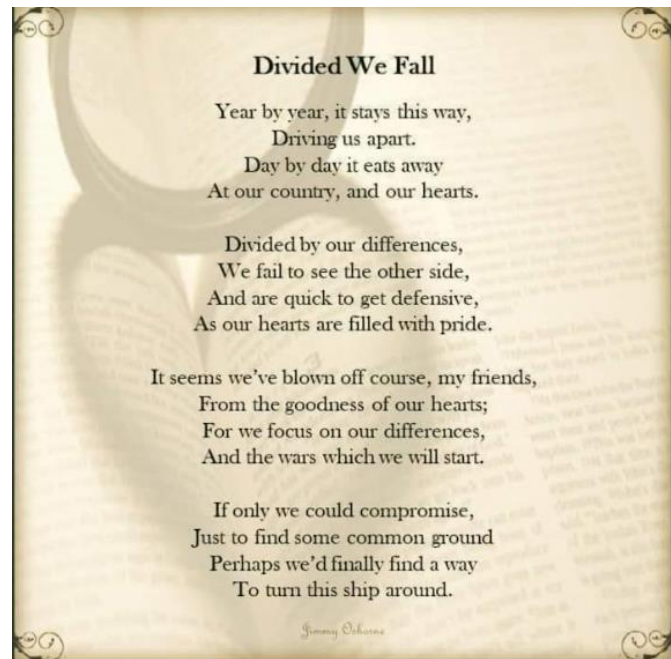
PROJECTED COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024 Military retirees, Social Security recipients, VA disability beneficiaries, and others receiving benefits tied to the federal cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will have to wait one more quarter to find out if their checks will get a boost in 2024.

Heading into the final three months of the 2023 fiscal year, rampant inflation looked like it might hit double digits, but the momentum tapered off. If this year's pace continues, we may see COLA somewhere between 2% and 3%.

But if any of these slight increments peter out, and if the Fed's efforts to curb inflation become realized, we might see a COLA at the very bottom of that range – as low as 2%, or just north of that. The most current data point is the June Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), which is 2.6% higher than last year's baseline, continuing an upward trend this calendar year – for now.

Service Officer:

It was my pleasure to attend the annual Veterans Service Officer (VSO) Training Conference in Boise on August 16 -18, 2023. The Riverside hotel has become our home for this event – they do not disappoint when it comes to hospitality.

Our training began at 0800 with a welcome and opening remarks by Office of Veteran Affairs (Boise) Bureau Chief Bill Heyob. He is a loud and proud Veteran of the Marine Corps. I always tell him he runs a tight ship, but he doesn't appreciate my Navy humor! Everyone had an opportunity to introduce themselves – where they are from, what agency they represent, and prior military service. Some good quick stories. Over my five years of attending, it's become a family affair and always special to see the faces and reestablish relationships.

Representatives from AARP, the VA Regional Office, and the Boise VA Medical Center (VAMC) gave reports with up-to-date facts and statistics. It might seem dry and appear political, but it's important. A lot of hot topics are discussed – problems and possible solutions addressed. Representatives from the Spokane and Walla Walla Medical Centers have yet to join us at these training events.

Top priorities within the State are all things therapy – refer to the Strong Veterans Act and hiddenheroes.com/respite. There was also discussion and attention to the Guard VA Benefits Act to address fraud claim sharks.

Day One continued with a presentation by the Idaho State Approving Agency (SAA) which ensures Veterans and eligible dependents can use the GI Bill educational entitlement and training facilities. Next was training by Ann Minami, a Veterans Law Judge from the Board of Veterans Appeals. She walked us through the appeals process with a detailed explanation – very informative.

Marcy Coffy, a social worker for the Boise VAMC, gave a great session on the VA Program for Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers. Their national support line is 1-855-260-3274 or go to www.caregiver.va.gov. The Director of Veterans Department at the Mesothelioma Center, Aaron Munz, explained how they serve Veterans affected by asbestos diseases and collaborate with VSO's to assist Veterans in their communities. More can be learned at www.VeteransOutreach@asbestos.com or 888-327-8271.

Day One was wrapped with Candi Anderson talking about the Idaho Honor Guard. As most of us know, she is the Area Coordinator for the Idaho Army National Guard. We were dismissed at 4:15pm and thanks to the AARP sponsored Hospitality Suite, some of us enjoyed refreshments and chat time.

Day Two was the killer. Lots of coffee needed to begin an early morning two-hour training session from the folks at the Pension Management Center in St. Paul, MN. They covered everything related to Blue Water, PACT Act, new presumptive illnesses (cancers, Agent Orange, radiation). Standard forms, outdated forms and continuing into qualifications for pensions, pension income exclusions, calculating net worth, and much more. They can be reached at 1-612-970-5737. And since the Minnesota folks have always loved to come to Idaho, we had a heavy hour with the folks from the Debt Management Center. It was enlightening to understand the process of why and how a debt is established, and the collection options to resolve a debt. Contact them at <http://www.va.gov/manage-va-debt/> or 800-827-0648.

After lunch, a representative from the local Social Security Administration covered basic programs, entitlement, and the importance of establishing a “my account” portal. Nannette Milliner, a Supervisor Field Examiner in Salt Lake City, told us about the Fiduciary Program which oversees management of benefits and ensures VA benefits are not misused. The final session of the day came from the VA Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) unit and Max Maxwell from the Boise VARO. They assist eligible and entitled Veterans with service-connected disabilities and an employment handicap to prepare for, obtain, and maintain a job. Their home page is www.va.gov/vre.

Day Three began with a video presentation from Kristan Hoffman in the VA Insurance Office, Philadelphia. As the 12th largest insurance program in the United States, the VA disburses billions of dollars each year at record speed. In fiscal year 2022, they averaged 2.4 days to complete insurance claims at 98.4% accuracy. They offer a large variety of policies – go to www.va.gov/life-insurance.

The new State Cemetery Bureau Chief Jacob Faulkner provided us with a quick history, including Idaho's first National Cemetery in Buhl. He covered eligibility, military honors, headstones and markers, costs, fees, rules, regulations. Use their website <http://www.veterans.idaho.gov/cemetery> or call their office at 208-780-1340. Idaho has two State cemeteries: Blackfoot and Boise. If you are in the Boise area, visit the cemetery which has 76.5 acres and includes over 8,000 casketed gravesites, 2,200 in-ground cremation gravesites and 5,760 columbarium niches. Their "scatter garden" is on the "upper level" overlooking the Treasure Valley and is protected by a huge American flag. Fun fact: due to the winds, the flag is replaced four times a year at a cost of \$5000 per flag.

We got excellent information from Callie Keller, Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, telling us all about Aid for the Aged, Blind and Disabled (AABD) Medicaid. Folks can apply using IDALINK at <https://idalink.idaho.gov/> or download from www.healthandwelfare.idaho.gov. Call them at 877-456-1233 (toll-free).

The final training session was given by Mitzi Cheldelin and Marisa McCarter, with IDVA Community Resources. If you have not heard about the Idaho Veterans Guide, PLEASE go to www.idahoveteransguide.org. This is a national database connecting veterans to low or no cost resources. Type in a zip code and you can find organizations offering everything from housing, food, health, legal, work, education, and more. This site is monitored closely and a work in progress. Mitzi and Marisa are warriors when it comes to helping veterans access any and all resources. [Editor's Note: See the article and link for the Veterans' Resource Guide on page 2 of this newsletter.]

By noon, we were wrapping up with critiques and per diem requests. I was lucky enough to stay in the area for a few extra days to visit family. Some of the North Idaho VSO folks were unlucky trying to get out of the Boise airport to Spokane due to the fire in the Medical Lake area. A later flight got them home.

My thanks to you Post members for supporting me as your Service Officer. I have more detailed information and will be provided with extra "hand-outs" on all subjects if you have any questions.

ESTATE PLANNING: Lesson 1 -- GETTING STARTED: WHAT AND WHY???

As the Post's Finance Officer I feel it is important that each of our Veteran members and their families have a Will and have considered an Estate Plan. Don't stop reading. This is NOT complicated! Your estate is simply the "Stuff You Own". That was easy! An Estate Plan is simply gathering a few important documents and having a discussion with your loved ones about what happens to your "Stuff" if you die or become incapacitated and can't handle manage your "Stuff".

This is the first of a number of articles (Lessons, if you will) to help you consider and discuss this important issue.

DO YOU HAVE A WILL AND AN ESTATE PLAN?

Planning your estate is an important part of providing for your needs during retirement and securing your legacy after you pass. But it's one that many people decide to put off or skip altogether. In 2022, **only 45% of people over the age of 55 possess crucial estate planning documents, like a will or a trust.** And despite the aging population and even the COVID pandemic, only two out of three adults have a will at all.

If you fall into these groups, there's no time like the present to get started on your estate plan. Regardless of the amount of assets you have, a well thought-out will can provide efficient and seamless distribution of your assets to your beneficiaries; not having a will is frequently the recipe of confusion and discord between beneficiaries. Maybe you made a plan while you were in your 30s or 40s. That's great! But know that the rules and regulations, along with your own family situation, have likely changed during that time. Reviewing your estate plan should be one of the first things you do in retirement — or even before you leave the workforce.

WHAT IS ESTATE PLANNING?

First, let's define your estate since that is what you are planning for, right? Your "estate" is the term used to indicate everything you own: your bank accounts, real estate, cars, clothing, collectibles, cash and even your social media account and data. Estate planning is the process of giving direction to your estate so that your assets are handled as you wish when you become incapacitated or in the event of your death.

Part of estate planning involves conversations with your loved ones to ensure they understand the process and know your wishes. It can be difficult to think about your own incapacitation or death, but the reality is that those around you need to know how to handle matters. Talk to your family and other trusted loved ones about how you want your healthcare managed, what to do with your finances, and to whom your money and other assets should go after your death.

Understand, too, that estate planning isn't a one-time event. Instead, you should review your estate plan at least every two or three years, or when you experience a major life event (like a birth, marriage, divorce, death, or moving houses). As you review your estate plan you will discover that there are a lot of important decisions that need to be made including an update of the terms of your will to clarify which assets should go to whom and when, change, add or remove beneficiaries, and even make adjustments to aspects of your investment portfolio or trust.

Our renewal drive is moving along at a steady pace! As of August 25th, our paid membership is at 78 of 142 for 2024. This is 52% so far, remember membership is everyone's responsibility. Once again, I highly recommend your use of the On-Line Renewal feature. It's fast and easy. Go to legion.org, click renewals. Make sure you have your ID card and credit card available for this transaction. One other thing to remember is **to not click on the Join button, only the Renew button.** Pressing the Join button places you in a Holding Post and not your active Post 154.

Please let me mention once again, when you join The American Legion through our Post the dues are \$45.00 annually. Sometimes National allows a \$25.00 annual membership fee which does not leave anything for our Idaho Department or Post 154. If you do recruit a new member, please sign them up through the Post. Normally, when you join through the Post the split is \$18.00 to National, 19.50 to the Department and \$7.50 to Post 154. The \$27.00 to the Department of Idaho and Post 154 stays in Idaho to benefit our local veterans and activities.

Please keep this in mind when you renew your annual dues.

Did you know...?

Eligible Veterans who are concerned about possible long-term health problems related to Agent Orange exposure can participate in the Agent Orange Registry. This free exam includes an exposure history, medical history, physical exam, and laboratory tests, as necessary. A VA health care provider will discuss the results with you.

Contact your local Environmental Health Coordinator to schedule an appointment for an Agent Orange Registry Health Exam.
